BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

Presenters: Sita Conde, City of Martinsville; Ariel Johnson and Danny Clawson; Virginia Harm Reduction Coalition; Amy Rice, Department of Social Services.

Grants Summary

1. Kinship Navigator: Targets families and children impacted by opioid and substance use disorder, particularly where parental use has resulted in kinship caregiving arrangements.

Reduces harm by:

- Stabilizing homes for children at risk of foster care involvement,
- Connecting caregivers to benefits, counseling, mental health services, and legal supports,
- Reducing long-term trauma pathways that increase substance use risk later in life.
- Operates before overdose or criminal-legal involvement, making it a preventative harm-reduction strategy.

2. VHRC Harm Reduction Expansion: Directly targets people who use drugs (PWUD) at highest overdose and infection risk in Martinsville and surrounding rural areas.

Reduces harm by:

- Expanding naloxone distribution (1,000 kits/year),
- Supporting overdose spike response coordination,
- Distributing safer-use supplies and safely disposing syringes,
- Connecting participants to peer supports (200 adults/year), o Addressing housing instability among PWUD.
- Operates at the point of highest mortality risk, making it a **life-saving harm-reduction** strategy.

Timeline & History

- National Agreements with Major Opioid distributes in Summer 2021
- Historic \$26B agreement provided to communities effected by Opioid epidemic
- Virginia Opioid Abatement Authority was established by MOU between VA state and local governments, This MOU dictates the distribution and use of the settlement funds.
- May/June 2023 — OAA Awarded the City of Martinsville and Henry County a Cooperative Planning Grant.
- Grant Award (State Funds) \$20,000 and MHC each matched the grant with a \$10,000 contribution from each.
- July/August 2023 — Request for Proposals advertised accordance with Virginia Public Procurement Act Guidelines
- Sept/October 2023 — City and County officials reviewed 5 proposals using a scoring matric
- Omni Institute was selected and awarded.
- Omni Institute performed a Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment focusing on opioid misuse and service gaps related to the Opioid epidemic
- August 13, 2024: Council received an update on Future and Current Opioid Settlements and Case
- April 1, 2025: City Council received a briefing on attainable OAA Funds and voted to approve the joint application with Henry County for a Kinship navigator and supported operations for Virginia Harm Reduction Coalition.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What are these grants for?

One grant expands overdose prevention and harm-reduction services through the Virginia Harm Reduction Coalition. The other funds a Kinship Navigator to support children and families impacted by substance use.

2. Why fund both?

Because the opioid crisis harms people in different ways. One grant prevents death today. The other prevents long-term harm to children and families. Together, they create a complete response.

3. Does harm reduction encourage drug use?

No. Harm reduction does not promote drug use—it prevents overdose deaths, infectious disease, and public safety risks while connecting people to support and treatment when they're ready.

4. How does the Kinship Navigator help with opioid issues?

Substance use often destabilizes families. The Kinship Navigator supports relatives caring for children when parents are struggling, reducing trauma, foster-care entry, and long-term risk.

5. Is Martinsville required to pay for these programs long term?

No. These are opioid-abatement grants with required reporting and evaluation. Any future

funding decisions would come back to Council.

6. Who oversees these programs?

Martinsville is the fiscal agent for both. Each grant requires formal agreements, performance reporting, and compliance with state laws.

7. How does this impact public safety?

Both grants improve safety—by preventing overdoses, reducing discarded needles, stabilizing families, and lowering long-term system costs.

8. What Is Harm Reduction?

Harm reduction is a public-health approach that aims to reduce the negative health, social, and economic consequences of drug use without requiring abstinence. It emphasizes meeting people “where they are,” minimizing preventable harm, and keeping individuals alive and engaged with services.

Core principles include:

- Non-judgmental, voluntary services
- Focus on health and safety rather than punishment
- Recognition that drug use exists on a spectrum
- Emphasis on dignity, community, and autonomy

9. What is Naloxone (Narcan)?

- Reverses opioid overdoses
- Widely recognized as one of the most effective overdose-prevention tools used by State and Local agencies across the nation.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

City Council is requested to consider an ordinance recognizing grant funding received through the Virginia Opioid Abatement Authority.

The amendment increases the Fund 75 – Opioid Budget revenue and expense appropriations by \$364,062.00 to reflect funding awarded through the Overdose Spike Response and Harm Reduction Access Grant. These funds will support local efforts to respond to overdose spikes and expand harm reduction strategies within the community.

The amendment also increases the Fund 72 – Opioid Budget revenue and expense appropriations by \$28,325.66 to recognize funding awarded through the Kinship Navigator Position – Henry–Martinsville Social Services Grant. This funding supports services provided through Henry-Martinsville Department of Social Services to assist kinship caregivers and families impacted by substance use.

The total proposed budget amendment is \$392,387.66.

This ordinance amends the City's Fiscal Year 2025–2026 budget to reflect previously approved funding, new revenues, and project updates. The changes ensure all funds are properly authorized and aligned with current projects and operational needs.

The amendment includes:

- Re-appropriation of prior-year funds for ongoing projects and equipment purchases
- Grant funding and reimbursements supporting public safety, infrastructure, and redevelopment efforts
- Loan proceeds for major wastewater system improvements

WHEREAS, funding for the One Ellsworth Relocation was included in the Fiscal Year 2025–2026 budget, but it is necessary to appropriate funds from the General Fund balance to support this budgeted expenditure;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Martinsville, Virginia, that the Fiscal Year 2025–2026 General Fund budget be, and hereby is, amended to appropriate Three Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$325,000.00) from the General Fund balance for the One Ellsworth Relocation line item.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption.
